



Designing with Edible Plants - A Fresh Look at a Growing Trend

Turn notions of what "ornamental" means upside-down and meet unusual plants you can safely eat (or not!). This colourful presentation gets you thinking about your



garden and edible plants in exciting new ways. Integrate beautiful edibles and edible beauty into your flower beds, vegetable patch, and menu - no matter how large your garden space!

### About the presenter:

Helen Battersby's city garden is so small she nicknamed it the Microgarden. Yet she's still able to harvest ingredients that find their way to the table. She hopes to introduce you to ways you can squeeze a more edible beauty into your vegetable and your flower garden.

Helen's a grad of the Landscape Design program at Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly Ryerson), and has over 20 years as a volunteer Toronto Master Gardener. She is also a past international director of GardenComm, the Association for Garden Communicators. You'll find her words and images in print and online media such as Garden Making and GardenDesign.com. With her sister Sarah, she writes the award-winning website TorontoGardens.com. The sisters also co-publish the Toronto & Golden Horseshoe Gardener's Journal which in 2022 won both Gold and Silver Medals for its 30th edition.

# Parkwood Tennis Court Gardens Rejuvenation Projects

In 2019, the Oshawa Garden Club, in partnership with Parkwood Estate and the Durham Master Gardeners, embarked upon a five-year rejuvenation project in the gardens known as the Tennis Court Gardens. Located just off the back parking lot and surrounded by cedar hedges, the two existing 70' long borders were in dire need of a garden redesign. In keeping with the 1920's and 1930's plantings of husband-and-wife landscape architect team, Lorrie and Howard Dunington-Grubb, our combined groups formed a design team to research the history of the Parkwood Gardens and the landscape architects that created them. Each year over the next four years a half border was designated for the removal of existing plants, soil remediation, design and plantings of new planting. Volunteers worked weekly throughout the garden season. Plants were selected based on the type of plants that would have been original to the gardens, with consideration for the hardiness and evolution of those plants.

The border gardens were completed as planned in 2023. While each of the partners made a financial commitment to the costs of the project with an initial pledge of \$10,000, an additional \$10,000 was raised over the five-year project timeline through annual Plant Sales utilizing plants culled from the gardens or grown from bareroot. While the majority of the budget was spent on plants, compost, and mulch, the group also enhanced the gardens with four unique obelisks and a bench dedicated to the volunteers of the project and positioned to view the beautiful gardens. Contrary to the engraved plaque on the bench "Sit Relax Enjoy" the volunteers barely stopped to smell the roses when their eyes fell upon the southern vista of the gardens and an exciting new project was formed.





# Parkwood Tennis Court Gardens Rejuvenation Projects, continued

The Lilac Dell is the newest rejuvenation project in the Tennis Court Gardens. Located at the southern portion of the gardens, overgrown bushes, lilacs and invasive plants were removed in 2024 and a design was created incorporating a pastel colour themed planting continuing the colour choices of the border gardens. These plants will be complemented by a selection of lilacs planted to enhance the gardens while enjoying the new view to the Fountain Pool and Tea House.

These projects would not have been made possible without the dedication and support of our volunteers. Throughout the gardening season, in all weather conditions, our volunteer gardeners enjoy their time learning about plant types, planting protocols, diseases, insects, and much more by working shoulder to shoulder with the Durham Master Gardeners and our own veteran gardeners. Since the beginning of this project, we have dedicated over 3,000 volunteer hours. We also enjoy sharing the many experiences with visitors to the gardens whether they be out of town visitors, hospital staff, neighbourhood coyotes or bald eagles flying through. Oshawa Garden Club members are always welcome to join us as we meet in the gardens Wednesday mornings from 9 am to noon. Our 2025 season runs from May to October.

# The Oshawa Garden Club's Giving Garden Project

Our garden club helps care for the beautiful gardens on the Parkwood Estate, which helps support our local hospital. It helps maintain the flower beds at Hearth Place Cancer Support Centre, a caring agency. But why does our garden club put time and effort into a Giving Garden?

Here in Oshawa, there are many adults and children experiencing food insecurity - too many. We can all see food prices going up in the grocery stores, increasing food insecurity for needy and low-income people. Our garden club can't fix the problem of hunger here, but we can donate healthy fresh vegetables that we have grown without pesticides or herbicides. Our produce can make a fresh, healthy, and tasty addition to someone's meals, while learning about gardening and contributing to directly to our community.

We have a great location for our club's Giving Garden, the Salvation Army's Community Garden, where we rent several beds.

Why do we rent garden beds from the Salvation Army's Community Garden?

- Their Community Garden is fenced and it has a locked gate: this has reduced theft from our vegetable beds to almost nothing.
- It has full sun and a water tap within the fenced area. Vegetables need full sun and dependable water.

Our Giving Garden volunteers come twice weekly (Tuesday and Friday mornings) to sow, plant, weed, and water vegetables. Most weeks we are also harvesting, the fun job! All of our produce is donated to the Salvation Army Food Bank. How much do our gardens produce? Last year we raised over 800 lbs of vegetables, all of which we donated to the Salvation Army Food Bank.

# Giving Garden Project - Continued

Why do we donate our vegetables to the Oshawa Salvation Army Food Bank?

- It is centrally located, where there is need.
- Most importantly, the Salvation Army Food Bank, as with all their other community services, serves based solely on a person's need and its capacity to help, regardless of the individual's race, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or religion.

Why should you join us as a Giving Garden Volunteer aside from doing something that helps so many others? Because we have fun! We have a great bunch of volunteers. We joke and laugh while we are gardening. And you do not have to be an expert to join us! Almost none of us knew about vegetable gardening before volunteering. This offers a great opportunity to learn about food production in an urban environment for people of all ages and stages of gardening ability. One of the best things about joining us? Our "office meeting" afterwards, at a well-known local coffee shop, LOL, where we have more fun getting to know fellow Oshawa Garden Club Members!
